


**Feature: Peer Learning's role in achieving the SDGs:  
The EIP Resource Library  
by the EIP Joint Secretariat**

The EIP has launched an [Evidence and Resource Library on Public Sector Reform](#), which documents country experiences, good practices and challenges in strengthening public institutions. The Resource Library publicises original, empirical research when and where knowledge gaps are identified and also shares a wide range of information on methodologies on peer learning. Below is a brief outline of how this problem-based tool can support your work.


1) In order to direct you to relevant publications and reports, the Resource Library is organised around six main categories to allow you to drill down to a particular issue (see below): i) What is the problem that the reform should tackle? ii) How can we design a successful reform? iii) How can we track and evaluate progress during the reform? iv) How can we share experiences and learn from others? v) How can development partners more effectively support reforms? vi) Where are the opportunities and constraints in making changes?

2) Once a problem-type is selected, further detailed options are provided. In the example below, the user selected the problem-type: "How can we share experiences and learn from others?" Two further options then appeared: i) conducting and using comparative research; ii) learning from peers.



3) The user can then select a theme to further refine the search. These include: public service delivery, performance measurement and evaluation, access to information/transparency, integrity

and anti-corruption, Public financial management/budget, accountability, public administration, E-government/ICTs, Regulatory governance, public procurement, tax policy and tax administration. In this example, the user selected access to information and public administration as themes and three resources were selected by the Resource Library.
